- All parents and guardians of sixth-grade students will receive "The Friday Five" via ParentSquare, a weekly newsletter containing important news and events involving sixth graders.

- Parents and guardians will receive ParentSquare "newsletters" from the principal on Mondays, the PTA on Wednesdays, and the sixth-grade teachers and District Office on Fridays.
- Students and parents may check assignment scores and absences using Aeries at https://sanluiscoastal.aeries.net.
- Assigned homework and major events will be listed on our "Class Calendar," which may be found at https://www.mrjarvis.net
- Students may also log in to "Clever" at https://clever.com/in/slcusd for class and school resources (e.g, Quizlet, ST Math, Accelerated Reader etc.).

HOMEWORK

- Students are expected to read an average of thirty minutes each night and complete one "Reading Response Log" entry each week.
 The reading response log will be completed in class and require students to document the progress they have made in their book and complete a short writing response to what they have read.
- Students will also be expected to complete math practice assignments every Monday through Thursday evening.
- Other work may occasionally need to be completed at home as well, but thirty minutes of reading and math will make up the majority of the homework that is assigned.
- Students are NOT to stay up late or spend an excessive amount of time on homework. Please notify me if your child is unable to complete a homework assignment in a "reasonable" amount of time.
- Homework assignments from my class will be posted on my class Website at https://mrjarvis.net under the "Homework Calendar."
- Homework is meant to reinforce the skills learned in class; it is NOT intended to be a source of frustration for families. If a student is unable to complete an assignment, have him or her contact me so that we can arrange for them to get some help.

STUDENT MATERIALS

- All students have access to a Chromebook while at school.
- Students are to have a binder, a pen, pencil, independent reading book, and paper with them daily.
- Earbuds are recommended, but may ONLY be worn for class activities.



BEHAVIOR

- Our class expectations are based on six "Keys to Success," which include Honor Good Acts, Strive to Improve, Stop Harm and Blame, Find Trusted Guides, Offer Help, and Make Amends.
- All students received a list of **class expectations**. A copy is available at mrjarvis.net.
- An individual behavior contract will be established for students who may be having on-going problems with their behavior
- Students will have the opportunity to receive raffle tickets for making positive choices.
 A raffle is conducted every Friday.
- Students who have trouble following the classroom expectations will experience the following sequence of consequences: 1) warning; 2) loss of recess; 3) restorative action plan. The teacher reserves the right to skip sequences if the misbehavior is severe.
- Any behavior that has the potential to harm another student either
 physically or emotionally will cause that student to be sent to the office
 regardless if any previous warnings have been given.

Reading

 Independent reading of books that are "just right" for your child's ability level and responding to that literature in writing will make up a large portion of our overall reading program.

- Students are expected to complete AT LEAST one book, take an Accelerated Reader Quiz on it and complete the "Independent Book Report" that will be posted on Google Classroom. These reports may be turned in at any time, but I will be grading them on the following dates: September 29th, November 2nd, and December 20th.
- Students must complete ONE official "Independent Book Report" by each of the aforementioned due dates. Students are STRONGLY encouraged to read more. For additional books read, the student only needs to take an Accelerated Reader Quiz and record the book in their book logs that are posted on Google Classroom.
- In addition to reading independently, students will be assigned reading material in class. In-class reading will consist of the following four major reading units: deep study of character, historical fiction book clubs, nonfiction, and social issues book clubs.

Writing

- Writing will be taught every day using the Lucy Calkins "Writer's
 Workshop" model.. Students are currently writing narrative essays that
 focus on writing descriptive details. The writing styles that will be
 covered are narrative, argumentative, and explanatory
 (informational).
- Scoring rubrics for the three main genres of writing may be found at <u>www.mrjarvis.net</u> in the Writing Resource section listed under "Resources." Click <u>HERE</u> for a direct link.
- Grammar and mechanics will be reviewed on most days through the review of short practice exercises.

SOCIAL STUDIES

 Sixth-grade social studies focuses on ancient civilizations and how these societies were cultivated. Students will be exposed to the complex dynamics that built these ancient civilizations. They will have the opportunity to analyze the numerous aspects that create cultures such as language, rituals, government structure, economics, religion, architecture, agriculture, irrigation, transportation, natural resources, and much more. Among the several

civilizations that we will study over the course of the school year are

Mesopotamia, Ancient Egypt, Ancient Greece, the The Roman Republic, and Ancient China.

- Fifth-grade social studies will focus on United States history. They
 will be learning about the Pre-Columbian Americas, The Age of
 Exploration, Colonial America, the events leading up to the
 American Revolution, Westward Expansion, and The
 Constitution.
- Social studies unit will require students to integrate their literacy skills through reading and the writing of responses related to the topics of study.

Math

- Ms. Unemar will be teaching the sixth graders math using the CPM Math program. This will be your student's first look at middle school math
- Mr. Jarvis will be teaching the fifth graders math using the Bridges program, the adopted curriculum for grades K - 5.



Science

 Students will be participating in hands-on activities as they learn about a variety of topics. These include but are not limited to the following: our atmosphere, the water cycle, earth's place in the universe, Earth and human activity, and energy

 The students will be going to Camp Alegra, near Cachuma Lake, from January 23rd - 26th. More information will be available as the trip approaches.

- Thanks to our PTA, additional field trips will be offered. More information will be provided later in the school year.
- More information about fifth-grade field trips will also be shared via our "Friday Five" as the planning information becomes available.

PROJECTS

- Research projects will be assigned throughout the school year.
- Students wishing to extend their own knowledge and/or earn extra credit will be encouraged to complete independent research projects and share them with their peers by creating a Website or movie, giving a talk, building a model, writing a paper, etc.

Devices and Computers

- Students all have access to Chromebooks in the classroom. These devices may only be used for school work unless special permission is granted.
- Chromebooks are monitored and protected by our Information and Technology Services department, but students are expected to use all electronic devices responsibly.



Innovation Lab

- Our class will be utilizing our Innovation Lab or completing some sort of project that requires the use of technology skills on Tuesdays.
- The Sinsheimer Innovation lab now has an aide and will be available to students every Tuesday during lunch.
